

ACTIVITY REPORT

WELFARE



Two 'Milans' were held to bid farewell to Mrs Leena Arvindan, the outgoing NWWA President, Station Lonavla, and to welcome Mrs Poornima Srinivas, NWWA President, Station Lonavla, respectively. A special Milan for the AGM was also held on 28th August.

The committee members, moving on transfer, were given a farewell and new committee members were also welcomed.

Team Welfare visited the ladies at the SMQ and the NSB areas and interacted with them on 16th March. Another visit was made to NSB on 19th September. The team plans to conduct more workshops and interactive sessions in the coming months. During the recent Operation Madad, on its part, NWWA, Station Lonavla, donated Rs25,000 towards the Kerela Relief Fund

Mrs Srivalli Srinivas, Mrs Sunitha Srinivasan and Mrs Suman Chandna visited the Kendra and the various NWWA facilities.

AROGYA

In January, the team conducted a Grihalaxmi Medical camp with INHS Kasturi to provide a free health check-up.

On 13th April, the 'Swayam Siddha/ Smart- Mom Contest' lecture series (aimed to increase awareness amongst members to develop confidence and self-reliance) were inaugurated. Spread over three months, the lectures comprised finance and household budget planning and personal health.



BALWADI

Balwadi celebrated Sports Day in March. The children celebrated Independence Day in August, with a special programme, themed 'National Symbols', comprising a relevant skit, a talk and a dance. Festivals like Janmashtami, Raksha Bandhan (the children created simple handmade rakhies) and Ganesh Chaturthi (the children used their imagination and drew little sketches of Lord Ganpati and coloured them) were celebrated.





Going ahead, the team plans to adopt the Reggio Approach for children, which emphasises on respect, responsibility and community through exploration and discovery, by introducing simple DIY, best-of-waste activities. They hope to conduct a little exhibition as well.

LITTLE ANGELS



A medical camp was organised in January at INHS Kasturi, where the children underwent a general examination and dental check-up. A picnic too was organised to the Aashiyana guest house grounds.

In May, Little Angels was officially handed over to the Indian Navy as per NWWA standing orders. The new academic session began with an Orientation Programme, where parents were briefed about the objectives and principles of the school. In August, a 'Green Colour Day' was held with a thumb-printing on a leaf sketch; Independence Day, Raksha Bandhan (children came in traditional attire and tied rakhies) and Janmashtami (complete with a dahi-handi) were also celebrated.

KALA KENDRA

Kàla Kendra, with aesthetic changes too, is buzzing with instrumental music and dance (Bollywood and Bharatanatyam) and coaching classes (for primary and secondary students).

In keeping with the 'Health is Wealth' theme, a cycling trip was organised for the ladies in April and a one-day Zumba workshop was held at the Kendra. The Kendra is also conducting Yoga classes, with an instructor coming in from the reputed Kaivalyadhama.



UDYOGIKA



Udyogika was reorganised structurally and aesthetically. Tailoring classes were resumed on a formal note, complete with a manual and syllabi, with ladies enrolling in large numbers. The ladies designed fabric coasters, bags, runners and table mats, which were sold at Samudri. The latest additions are kitchen curtains, a special eco-friendly 'vegetable-bag' and a handy bag to hold yoga mats. In August, the unit began taking orders for stitching (table cloth, runners, cushion covers, salwar sets, kurtis and saree blouses) and also offered an opportunity to the ladies to conduct workshops and contribute in fabric painting, embroidery and stitching to enhance the products.

OUTREACH - SPARSH & ASHIRWAD

Over 100 children from the Balgram Orphanage visited the Base in January, along with their support staff. A movie 'Ice Age' was screened at Menaka Auditorium and the children were provided a packed lunch. On 20th April, the team also interacted

with 29 children from Committed Communities Development Trust, Mumbai. The children visited the Base, various facilities, interacted with naval personnel and witnessed live fire-fighting drills at the Fire Brigade. Essentials and groceries were also donated to the Trust.

A Donation Box is being placed at the Unit-run Canteen to encourage residents to donate essentials and toiletries, which would be handed over to the Old Age Blind Home in Khandala.

In January, **Ashirwad** conducted an interactive programme, with games and tambola for senior citizens of the Base. This was followed by a performance by the INS Shivaji Naval Band.



SAMUDRI

Aesthetic changes were made to Samudri, and the shop stocked with crafts, pottery and articles from Delhi, New Craft Village, Khurja and Udyogika.

Stone and cloth jewellery and candles, made in-house by the ladies, were added.

The shop is scheduled to undergo a facelift and a renovation soon.



ARCHIVES

An Archives team has been set up to gather information, photographs and updates to maintain records of all the past Presidents of NWWA, Station Lonavla and of their achievements in the Base.

SOUNDARYA

The well-renovated beauty parlour Soundarya is fully functional. A new beautician joined the team of two at the parlour in July. Appointment letters were given to all of them. The parlour also assisted make-up and hairstyle for the ladies participating in the Monsoon Concert held in August.

SANCHAR

The team published the October 2018 edition of Varuni called 'Imprints'. The team also forwarded a report on NWWA activities to the Southern Command for Archives and a brief summary for the Quarterdeck magazine. Work is on for material to be forwarded for the next Veerangana themed 'Health is Wealth' and a quarterly NWWA e-mag.

PRAKRITI

In April, the team organised an Ikebana competition for all the ladies. On 5th June, celebrating World Environment Day, Prakriti held a plantation drive with ladies and families. They planted almost 100 butterfly-attracting saplings, with an aim to create a butterfly garden in the Base.

The team also conducted an old newspapers 'bag-making' activity in August, for ladies and children to create awareness about eco-friendly alternatives to plastic. The children stamped block-printed designs on the bags, which were later gifted to the NWWA Samudri shop.

THE LADIES OF LONAVLA

The endearing Mrs Shaku Rao's wit and wisdom are to be treasured. The ladies of Station Lonavla are enriched.



"Having been posted to INS Shivaji in December 1978 from a deputation at HAL Bengaluru for my husband, we arrived with a toddler son, a first for Shivaji House. We were greeted by the good and familiar Naval Base where I first arrived as a bride. Bengaluru was a wonderful experience, but I sorely missed the Naval atmosphere.

Memorable experiences, as with all of us having lived in Shivaji, are many. However, the bonhomie of the families stands out for me. Our dearest friends today are still the ones we made in Shivaji, and after almost six decades of friendship, we still meet often. The internet allows us now to keep in touch with those in distant lands, with news of one another and our families. This is joy immeasurable with INS Shivaji our bedrock.

NWWA, or NOWA as we knew it then, has had a sea change. Times have changed and the need for having NWWA was recognised too. Importantly, it now encompasses officers' and sailors' wives, and has become very streamlined, giving it

more power and has given better results which were unimaginable when I was a bride. In a lighter vein, when I first arrived at Shivaji, the Education Officer had two wives which was legal in Andhra Pradesh!. Two wives and hence two subscriptions was the benefit to NOWA! To their amazing credit, they both lived in harmony under one roof, and had a very loving family. Those were the days my friends.

Living together as an extended family is my mantra for a happy stay at INS Shivaji. This gives peace and joy to one's children and husbands too."



A MAGICAL JOURNEY

Mrs Anjali Deshpande has a one-of-kind-connect to INS Shivaji - as the daughter of a Commanding Officer, commissioning the first course of NEC and, twenty-five years later, as the First Lady. Warm, graceful and friendly, Mrs Deshpande shares her rich experiences.

"INS Shivaji holds a special place in my heart as I have spent two memorable tenures here. I had the good fortune to live in INS Shivaji as the daughter of the Commanding Officer in 1984. It was on the lawns of Shivaji House that a smart young Lieutenant asked his Commanding Officer, for his daughter's hand-in-marriage. The rest, as they say, is history. Twenty-five years later, I returned as the wife of the Commanding Officer!

As I recall, in the early eighties, NWWA was not so formally organised. But I do remember my mother being always busy with Welfare activities. With no NWWA Kendra or office, meetings and events were conducted in the Mess.



The focus was on community bonding with badminton matches, cooking competitions and garden shows, as well as Outreach programmes at the nearby Balgram and Kurwanda village.

I had the privilege to take over as President, NWWA, INS Shivaji in 2008. Thanks to the vision of my predecessors, there was now a well-oiled system in place. I had the luxury of functioning from a beautiful NWWA Kendra. An interesting analogy is that the small rubber plant planted by my mother in the Shivaji House garden had grown over the years into a majestic rubber tree! It stands overlooking the lawns even today, a tribute to the loving care of all the inhabitants of that heritage home. The aim of my NWWA team was to involve as many ladies as possible in activities, including fun events like children's Talent shows, cycle treks in the rain and the Base 'Nritya Natikas'. A unique initiative we started was activity classes for children of the domestic help and Mess workers with ladies, children and even undertrainee officers, teaching them English, music and sports.

Often I have been asked, "Was it better being the daughter or the wife of the CO?" My reply is, "it is like the difference between an Undertrainee Officer and a Staff Officer".

As a trainee you have all the fun, with no responsibility. As a Staff Officer you have the fun, the responsibility and the power - to make a difference. Hopefully, in my small way, I was able to do that, simply by encouraging everyone to make the most of our idyllic retreat in the Sahyadris. My credo was – 'Step out, enjoy picnics with your children, potlucks with your neighbours and romantic dinners with the clouds rolling through your home. Revel in the opportunity to appreciate the glamour, pomp and show of Naval life by attending Station Receptions, Mess Nights, Parades et al".

Living in a small Base is a unique experience compared to the relative anonymity of life at a Command HQ. A close-knit community working together builds strong bonds and a great opportunity to interact with the extended Naval family.

My words for young naval wives would be - Contribute your bit, be it little or large, towards enhancing the welfare and wellbeing of all those who are fortunate to call INS Shivaji their home. Trust me, when you give a little, you will get more happiness than you ever expected in return!"





KNOWING, GOING AND SHOWING THE WAY

The friendly and elegant **Mrs Sunitha Srinivasan** sums up her unique association (having lived here when Rear Admiral Srinivasan was posted as a Lt, a Lt Cdr, Cdr and Cmde) with INS Shivaji by quoting a few lines written by John C Maxwell (Author & Speaker): 'A leader is one who knows the way, goes the way and shows the way'.



"Almost 25 years ago, when I entered Shivaji for the first time in December 1994, I had a few inhibitions, little knowing that this would be the beginning of a wonderful relationship with the establishment. My husband, then a young Lieutenant, had just completed his M.Tech and we had welcomed our daughter Malavika, a few months earlier. We moved into a quaint Lieutenant's house in Rajendra Nagar (P-270/4) and were blessed to have wonderfully warm and effusive neighbours. I instantly felt at home. It was not long before I was drawn into the routine and rhythm at Shivaji. I volunteered actively for NWWA, regularly lending a hand at Little Angels as well. I was fortunate to be a part of the Golden Jubilee event too. We spend four-and-a-half years. During this time, my husband put on his next rank as Lt Cdr and we had our second daughter Lavanya in 1998. This phase meant five torrential monsoons, innumerable treks and picnics, impromptu bonfires and potluck dinners, social functions, parades and ceremonies, all creating a magical necklace of spellbound memories and innumerable friendships and blessings. Although I left Shivaji with a lump in my heart, I stepped as a confident Naval Wife, acknowledging

the role that NWWA played in this transformation.

My husband returned as Cdr-Training, PCT Officers, and a decade later, most unexpectedly, as Oi/C CMET. He was now a Captain. This tenure too was filled with unforgettable memories, including the Silver Jubilee of the NEC. Being Vice-President, NWWA, enabled me to take on a wider gamut of responsibilities, and experience first-hand what it was to organise, manage and execute well-laid plans. The team pulled together as one unit; and I learnt the importance of team work and camaraderie. During this tenure, I also had the opportunity to officiate as the President (as the First Lady was away). At that point I did not, for a moment, imagine that this was merely a portent of things to come.

Having left Shivaji in 2010, I yearned to go back. It was in December 2013 that my husband was selected to serve as the Commanding Officer of INS Shivaji. I had to now don the onerous hat of being the First Lady and President, NWWA, INS Shivaji. I had to 'SHOW' the way! I was blessed to have a 'Dream Team', reflecting an exuberant and spirited front. The experience garnered over the various tenures and the lessons learnt under dynamic Presidents and senior ladies of the past, stood me in good stead. The support and praise we received from the President, Southern Region, NWWA, is testimony to the effort and hard work put in by every single lady here. I look back at this tenure as being amongst the best and, unfailingly, thank God for his grace and blessings.

Shivaji has become an inseparable part of our lives. I am grateful to have received this precious bounty from the alma mater of the Engineers. But I am even more grateful for having had the opportunity to serve, nourish and cherish Shivaji. I have seen the establishment's Golden Jubilee and am honoured to see Shivaji march proudly into the Platinum Jubilee year. I hope and pray that I live to see 15 Feb 2045 when Shivaji would celebrate 100 years of honourable and unstinted service to the Indian Navy and the Nation. So help me God!"

IMPRINTS

INS Shivaji is home to several civilians. Their relationship with the Base is intrinsic and symbiotic. Generations have served, and generations will follow. Team Sanchar interacted with a few of the inspiring men and women.

CURATOR PAR EXCELLENCE



Light-eyed and a genial smile to go with it, **Shivram Dinkar Kadam**, a gazetted Foreman, is a mine of information on the training engines and machinery at the Base. He is perfectly placed too, as curator at the Naval Engineering Museum, Motivation Hall and Remembrance Hut.

His knowledge comes from a keen sense of learning and observing. Kadam's career has taken some intriguing twists and turns - he has been instrumental in the laying of the first LPG gas-stove pipe connection at the Wardroom Mess Kitchen in 1982, followed by the same in the other ten Mess kitchens in the Base (receiving training and authorization at an HPCL plant). He proudly recollects conducting 'cooking- gas-safety-and precaution' workshops for the ladies of (what was then known as) NOWA. He has been awarded a C-in-C commendation in 1985 and a CNS commendation in 1998.

FAMILY TRADITIONS ARE FOR KEEPS

Begin a conversation with **Mohammad Hafeez Youniz Khalifa** about his father, and your mind travels back to a time when the Base hosted the British, before an Independent India was born. **The well-built and friendly barber has the knack of fine story-telling. While his stories seem ageless, they are true.**

Hafeez's grandfather, a Hakim from Uttar Pradesh, moved to Lonavla and set up a Barber shop in the town in the early '30s. His father continued with the tradition, and shifted to the Base in 1945, when the British set up HMIS Shivaii.

Today, Hafeez walks in their footsteps. Having grown up, married and started his family life here too, his attachment to the Base is evident. He feels blessed to receive the respect (that he has rightfully earned), the love and the affection from the naval personnel and families stationed here. His son Mohammad too assists him at the shop. Hafeez has never felt the need to move out because as he says, "INS Shivaji is home".



WHEN LEGENDS OF A DIFFERENT KIND WALK THE EARTH

Walking down the lanes of the Base, if you happen to smile at a crinkle-faced, old man in the trademark Wardroom Mess blue uniform, and he returns your greeting, swinging his arms widely and saying, "Namaste!", you know you have met the



legendary **Dattu More**. A household name for almost every officer that has lived in the Wardroom, he is also known for his love for a hearty drink or two. Tales have been spun around the man and his antics, the fondness for him so evident.

While his memory now fades, and the men have passed on, he lives to tell a loving story or two of almost all the Commanding Officers that he has served since then.


A worthy recipient of two C-in-C commendations, Dattu More still continues to serve, with a smile, extending his blessings to all.

Over 800 personnel, including families, participated learning the 'Anapana' meditation technique that assists all-round mental, academic and personality development.






At the Base, the ladies have also participated in the Station Badminton Championships, in all levels - singles, doubles and mixed doubles. The winning smiles say it all.
