



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

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Regular academics activities such as CPCs, Guest faculty lectures, clinical case discussions are conducted every month by all departments in rotation as per academic calendar formulated by the Academic Council in addition to the syllabus laid down by the University. Curriculum development is encouraged by individual schools and colleges under the Institute of Naval medicine

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Regular participation in Research Methodology and MET and ATCOM (Attitude and Communication) workshops held by MUHS is ensured

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Basic Medical Sciences capsule is held for all first PG residents on joining, followed by multispeciality MCQs and subjective examination and assessment. Internal Assessments (Formative Assessments) including Theory and Practicals are held twice a year. University Examinations (Exit Examination) is held twice a year for all courses conducted by the Institute.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

All MD/MS students have to do a research project and submit it to the University as a Thesis. BSc Nursing students do Group Department Projects. All Faculty are encouraged to put up Armed Forces Medical Research Project proposals every year. All research projects are scrutinized by the Institute Ethics Committee with recommendations if any before commencement.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Full-fledged library with e-journals and internet facility with ERMED consortium access is available Rs 4.5 lakh new books and journals were purchased in the last Academic year. A Common Reading Room (open 24 hrs) is available for students




